Message from the Chair

The Board of HIPPY Canada is pleased to report that HIPPY has increased the number of sites and families served in 2013-14. HIPPY Board and staff are adjusting to the ever-changing reality for today's not-for-profit sector and the organization is now well positioned to meet the new government expectations of increased accountability and partnerships funding.

After years of external research and internal reflection we are very confident that the HIPPY program will continue to work with its platform of mothers helping mothers. We work with isolated mothers where they live – at home – and we connect them with other mothers in their communities who share an intimate awareness of the issues and challenges they face. HIPPY Home Visitors have the experience and training to move mothers and their families out of isolation and into a vibrant community and economic life.

We propose to take this innovation to the next level through the creation of The AVIIMA (A Vision for the Inclusion of Isolated Mothers Across Canada) Centre, which will serve as a virtual national consortium of like-minded organizations dedicated to the mandate of opening doors to isolated mothers and their families. The HIPPY program will remain the core activity of AVIIMA, and its work will be based on the established principles of the HIPPY program. In areas such as food security, health, employment, education, literacy and housing, AVIIMA will work to meet the complex needs of isolated mothers. The Centre's activities will focus on rigorous evaluation and research as well as professional development functions.

Over the coming months, we shall keep you fully informed of progress on this exciting new initiative. On behalf of the Board and staff of HIPPY Canada we thank you for your continued support.

Message from the President and Chief Executive Officer

HIPPY Canada remains dedicated to supporting measurable and positive change in the lives of all HIPPY families. Together our 20+ sites, we served almost 900 families whose children were deemed at risk of falling behind at school. Positive results continue: parents and caregivers are more confident in their ability to support their children's scholastic success, and Home Visitors receive invaluable and rewarding work experience. Have a look at our HIPPY calendar, where you will find inspirational testimonials of personal, familial, and community change, from parents, children and Home Visitors.

The HIPPY Canada national office continues to develop tools to support HIPPY sites designed to help staff and participants reach their goals.

A few milestones this year include:

A generous contribution from Citizenship and Immigration Canada to launch a three-year pilot project to develop, implement, and evaluate the innovative, high-impact HIPPY Hub Model with two immigrant-serving organizations: Vancouver's MOSAIC and Ottawa's Vanier Community Service Centre.

Also part of this project is a comprehensive Home Visitor professional development training program covering adult education and learning; community systems and asset mapping; home visiting; personal growth and leadership development; newcomer settlement; early childhood development and parenting skills; and building bridges with Aboriginal people in Canada.

Prairie Research Associates (PRA) is undertaking a mixed-method research project involving interviews, surveys, observations, and data analysis over two years at Toronto's Thorncliffe / Flemington site.

Aboriginal and Northern Development Canada (AANDC) supported HIPPY with two projects, one to reach out to organizations off-reserve in Northern Saskatchewan and one to support HIPPY First Nations sites with outreach activities on-reserve. With AANDC support, we added five new Aboriginal books to the HIPPY curriculum and, recognizing the importance of the history of Aboriginal peoples in Canada, Aboriginal HIPPY Canada designed seven Home Visitor cultural modules to foster opportunities for Aboriginal HIPPY Home Visitors to reconnect meaningfully with their Aboriginal identity.

Shaista

Because I didn't get an education from here, like a childhood education from Canada so I don't know about the education system. So HIPPY gave me lots of ideas and was helpful with getting my son in kindergarten and junior kindergarten.

My daughter joined school this year and all the teachers and everybody were very happy with her. They said that she already knows how to write down her name, she already knows the A to Z alphabet, counting and the teachers say they really like my kids, they are always really involved. They do more activities, active things and are always learning. So I think all these good things come from the HIPPY program.

The Outcome

HIPPY children have skills that enable them to succeed in school.

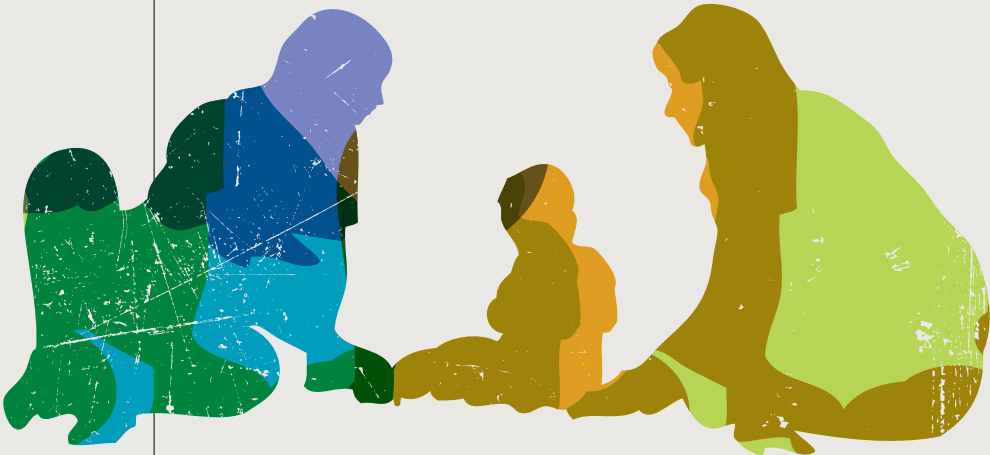
Erika came to Canada from Mexico. After facing barriers related to social isolation, language, and employment, Erika found the HIPPY program and eventually became a Home Visitor, an opportunity that has helped her make positive changes in her community and in the lives of the HIPPY moms she visits.

Erika

HIPPY gave me this opportunity. And now I want to do everything and I want to my put all my time into this and learn. Because when I learn I know more people and can help people, and help women in the same sort of situation as me, isolated and everything. Sometimes when I was with them for the first time, I saw my face in them, isolated and "I can't do this, I can't do this." But after they say "I can handle this more and more" and now my mothers are the same like me, they are starting to look for jobs and start to look for courses and start to be motivated.

The Outcome

57% of HIPPY Home Visitors were once mothers in the program.

Aarthy

Before I was not working and I don't have much work experience but HIPPY gave me more energy. Before that I was so shy and I never went for any job but now after HIPPY I thought that I'm good in teaching. After that I wanted to take a trial to see if I was good or not. So I joined the program at my son's school for volunteer reading, so I took a volunteer position and got a good name there. And now because of my volunteering work they are ready to give me a job as a lunch supervisor also. This all comes because of HIPPY. HIPPY is the basic route for my career. And now for my future plans I want to do some courses in my line, mainly in the teaching line. I want to be a good teacher.

The Outcome

47% of mothers engage in additional education, training and/or employment-search opportunities beyond the HIPPY program.

One big help I learned through HIPPY is they put into my heart that parenting is fun. One of the greatest achievements that I have is being a mom.

The Outcome

77% of HIPPY mothers have acquired life skills and knowledge about Canadian life, customs, and local transportation necessary for healthy and integrated families.

Nancy came to Canada from China in 2006. She wanted to be able to teach her children about Canada while also retaining some of her Chinese ideas and values.

Nancy

I just wanted to keep some of good benefits from my culture, but I also wanted to change and use ideas from other programs and other parents so they could learn about the Canadian culture and the Canadian way to teach kids. I teach my son at home no English, just Chinese. But he can handle the two languages, Chinese at home and English at school with no trouble. I would add some Chinese culture and Chinese words and books and poems and teach them at home, same as with the HIPPY program. So I learned a lot of skills with these modules and the HIPPY program!

Hoa

I started to be more confident. I started to know my rights and I started to know what is the best for my kids. From HIPPY I know more about the culture, Canadian culture and then more English for me. I learned more English through the curriculum. Because of this program my family changed a lot, we got a lot happier. And I know how to be happy, and value myself too, and to value others. So, just a big thank you for HIPPY.

The Outcome

83% of mothers in the HIPPY program understand and act upon their rights and responsibilities as members of Canadian society.

Sabine is a Home Visitor with the HIPPY program in Ottawa. She and her husband came to Canada ten years ago from the Netherlands. As a Home Visitor, Sabine notices that HIPPY teaches parents skills and ideas that might not be common in their own culture.

Sabine

Sometimes when I visit families, they do not always seem to know how to do activities with their child. When they receive their curriculum, when they do the activities with their child, it inspires them to do more, to interact more with their child. And I've noticed in some cultures, it's not really common to just sit down and read a book to your child, or just play a game or to actively interact with your child, it's not always part of what they know. And with HIPPY I think it gives them tools to interact with their children and to come up with ideas, like what to do with them. Not every parent realizes that it's not teachers, it's not other people in the community. The parent is the number one educator.

The Outcome

76% of HIPPY Home Visitors have in-depth knowledge of materials and the skills to develop HIPPY mothers' capacity to support their children's learning.

Jenny came to Toronto from China in 2005. She attended a language school and met people there who gave her information on services, including the HIPPY program. In her first Home Visit, she was only able to understand the curriculum if translated into Chinese. Now, Jenny's son is excelling in school, and Jenny introduced the teacher to the HIPPY program.

Jenny

Because of HIPPY, my son builds his reading habits. For him, HIPPY gave him life long benefits. People love reading. I think that the benefits will be for his whole life. I was so happy because I didn't know how to play with my son and how to teach him. I always read Chinese stories to my son and only just knew to teach him 1-2-3-4, to count, that's all. HIPPY changed our family. It gave me the benefits for our family, even for my husband. Before only I played with my son, but when we attended HIPPY, my husband got involved.

The Outcome

61% of HIPPY mothers have meaningful interactions with their children's schools, daycares, or pre-schools.

After completing her course and Home Visiting, Nagham is working in a full-time position. The HIPPY program and her job as a Home Visitor has helped her in her professional life.

Naghm

The HIPPY program has helped me a lot to adjust to life in Canada. Through HIPPY, I started going outside. My site was at the Hub, and I decided to go discover what was at the Hub and I applied for a volunteering job over there. Then I started volunteering and it was working at the reception. After that, I saw that they were hosting a workshop about how to choose a college or university. I got accepted and I thought I'd like to help families, and newcomers, with my experience as a new immigrant, I want to do that. You know, when you like the job, you do your best. And I think that shows at the end of the year with all the families. Being the Home Visitor was something I was honoured to do.

The Outcome

After three years, 56% of Home Visitors transition to a new career or higher education.

I tell them, "it's a whole new world out there and you'll love it."

The Outcome

93% of Home Visitors have the knowledge and skills to support mothers to increase their social inclusion in HIPPY group activities and community events.

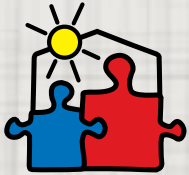
